Workshop Objectives

General objective:

To provide an opportunity for indigenous peoples to present their experiences and practices on how they have conserved their forests and resources through their customary systems of resource management and their indigenous knowledge systems and to discuss how these systems can be strengthened further and used to influence the REDD Plus architecture at the national and global levels and for them to learn more about other technical issues being tackled at the UNFCCC processes.

Specific objectives:

- 1. To share case studies from Kenya, Indonesia, Nicaragua and the Philippines on indigenous peoples' knowledge and experiences on forest and natural resource management and draw lessons from these;
- 2. To identify steps needed to strengthen such forest and resource management practices and steps to integrate these in the national and global REDD Plus processes;
- 3. To increase the participants knowledge on REDD Plus-related technical issues and the present level reached in the negotiations in the UNFCCC and other REDD-related processes like the Interim REDD Plus Partnership;
- 4. To brainstorm on steps needed to develop a REDD Plus architecture at the national and global level.
